Discussion - discuss one or more of the following...

Share with each other the thoughts and images you have of a mudslide or avalanche. Do these images provoke mainly positive or negative responses? We can use these natural images as metaphors for destructive emotion and action: a "mudslide of hate," or an "avalanche of hate and violence." What are your reactions to images of hate and violence? Negative or positive? How is hate like a mudslide or avalanche? What do you do when you become aware of the small beginnings of hate inside of you?

Read over Luke 6:27-38.

The "Sermon on the Plain" follows the account of Jesus' call to his disciples." What significance, if any, do you find in the fact that Jesus addresses this sermon not to the multitudes (vs. 18-19) but specifically to "his disciples" (vs. 20)? This Sermon is really an "orientation lecture" for life in God's Kingdom. How do the sermon's initial teachings in verses 20-26 orient Jesus' disciples to values and priorities that distinguish God's realm for earthly realm? When have you been recipient of this kind of generous love that expects "nothing in return" (vs. 35)? Which of Jesus' practical examples of love do you find most challenging to live out? Why?

Read over Psalm 103:1-14

What specific "benefits" from God does the psalmist note when observing her life? How many, if any, of these same benefits are you able to identify when you observe your own life, or the lives of those around you? The psalmist calls for wholehearted praise of God (vs. 1). What does it

look, sound, and feel like when everything within us blesses God's name? How is such praise a way to love God? Verse 8 points out that it is a command God's hesed—steadfast (constant) love. How does the psalmist define and describe God's hesed? What motivates God's loyal love? What is ought to be the relationship between God's hesed and our own?

> In the box is a quote from Martin Buber, read it over and discuss. How do you meet God when you lavish love your neighbor?
