BE LOVE: Value the Vulnerable

Discussion - discuss one or more of the following...

Share times in your life when you have been seen as an "outsider." What were the circumstances? How was their "outsider" status communicated to them, both overtly and implicitly? How did they respond.

Now, discuss a time when you were aware of being an "insider." How was your "insider" status communicated not only to them, but also to any "outsiders"? How comfortable or uncomfortable with being an "insider" in the situation were you and why? How do we not make the distinction between "outsider" and "insider"?

Read over Mark 5:1-20

The 'country of the Gerasenes" (vs.1) was Gentile territory (as the presence of people raising pigs indicates). Why is it important to know this fact when reading this story?

Why do you suppose Mark describes the demon-possessed man in such detail (vs.2-5)? How does the man's strength and the place where he lives affect our understanding of his vulnerable status in his society, as well as the practical implications of what Jesus does for him?

In verse 9 Jesus names the demon as a way of showing power over it. We too, must make an effort to learn the names of the "demons" in people's lives and in the Brooklyns. What are the names of the "demons" you see—not necessarily supernatural beings, but strong and powerful forces threatening people and the community's health and wholeness?

How can "naming demons" help us "evict them"?

Instead of responding with joy to Jesus' healing of the man, other Gerasenes beg Jesus to go away (vs. 17). Why can acts of compassion and healing for vulnerable people feel so disruptive and threatening to people who aren't vulnerable? When have you seen such acts make others angry in your own experiences? Have your loving actions ever made other people angry? How did you respond.

I think I began learning that those who are happiest are those who do the most for others. This lesson I have tired to carry with me ever since.

Which of these groups do you think religious people still tend to regard as "outsiders" and why? What modern groups would you add to the list of "outsiders" whom Jesus would consider "insiders"?

In the box is a quote from Booker T. Washington. He mentions doing things for others tends to make the happiest people. Read over the quote and discuss if you agree or disagree with him and why?
