Discussion - discuss one or more of the following...

Take the next 2 minutes and look at your hands! When the 2 minutes are over, invite each person to share observations about their hands. Be detailed and specific. What, if anything, do you think your hands show yourself or others about your heart?

As symbols if all we do in our lives, our hands express the love for God and neighbor in our hearts do they not?

"Jesus shows us the hands and heart of love ... we cannot have Jesus' hands without Jesus' heart, and we probably won't cultivate Jesus' heart until our hands are accustomed to working in the ways of Christ." *Tom Berlin, Reckless Love*How do our hands reflect the love of Christ?

Read over John 13:1-17, 34-35

Why does John describe Jesus' actions at this meal so deliberately and in such detail? What makes Jesus' action so notable and unusual? Jesus tells his disciples he is setting an example of loving service for them to follow. What are some specific ways in which you strive to follow Jesus' example "day by day...in both good seasons and bad"?

Read over Matthew 25:34-40

How does the actions of by which the king judges the nations in Jesus' parable help us define the nature of love? John Wesley says we serve the invisible God by serving our neighbors who are "standing visibly before us." Who do you see visibly before us?

Read over Luke 9:23-25

People sometimes describe their troubles as "my cross to bear." How is that sentiment like or unlike what Jesus is talking about in these verses? Why does Jesus specify his followers must take up their crosses daily? Tom Berlin says, "We have to let those parts of our nature which are contrary to love die." What must we do or not do to sacrifice those parts of ourselves?

I think I began learning that those who are who do the most for others. This lesson I have tired to carry with me ever since.

In the box is a quote from Fred Rogers. Discuss how important you are to the lives of those you meet. What part of yourself do you leave happiest are those behind with every meeting you have? As a fun/fellowship event, watch the movie A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood together later in November.
